Leukerbad is about 1400 meters high

The calcium sulfate water with remarkable fluoride content and the majestic view of the Daubenhorn massif complete the experience full of peace and relaxation. And if you like something a little more extravagant, there are events such as the Aqua Mystica or a champagne breakfast in the pleasantly warm water.

Snow-Park / Sports Arena: Leukerbad



Alpine skiing on Torrent, cross-country skiing on the Gemmi Pass: Leukerbad offers around 53 km of ski slopes, 30 km of cross-country ski trails and a large sports arena with a climbing wall, ice and curling hall, indoor tennis courts, squash courts and a weight room. For winter hikers, the path from Gemmi Pass to Sunnbüel (approx. 9 km, 2.5 hours hiking time) is kept open in winter if weather conditions permit.

There is a real ski paradise for children right next to the Leukerbad sports arena. Equipped with three conveyor belts, a carousel as well as a drag lift and a button lift, the Snowpark Sports Arena is the ideal place to learn snow sports. The ski instructors on site make it easier for young and old to get used to the snow and the equipment.

Children's snow lands

Learning to ski with fun and games – this is the perfect mix for teaching children about winter sports! In the Valais children's snow regions, the little ones are accompanied and supported by ski instructors and can thus have their first snow sports experiences.



Albinen im Kanton Wallis has a unique way trying to repopulate

News outlet Courier Mail shared this cool update in a TikTok video on Wednesday, January 3, and if you've ever had dreams of packing your bags and starting a new life in [Switzerland](#), this is your big chance!

Apparently, there's a village called **Albinen/Wallis** in the [Swiss Alps](#) that's facing a declining population and needs to rectify the problem fast, so they're offering families of four \$90,000 to move there.

There's one catch, though: Employment opportunities in this Swiss village are rare, which is contributing to the fact that people keep leaving, so this is ideal for remote workers who won't have to worry about finding local employment.



And since the goal is to repopulate the village, there are a few stipulations to ensure they reach that goal: everyone in your family needs to be under the age of 45 or be a Swiss citizen already. If you take them up on this offer, you have to agree to stay for 10 years, or you'll have to pay the money back. Sounds like a reasonable deal.

They've Already Had a Huge Response

Since they began advertising this offer, the Alpine village has received hundreds of requests from people hoping to move there, and as of April 2023, they'd only been able to approve 17 families to move in who fit the requirements.

As the program continues, mayor Nicole Köppel told [Watson.ch](#) that before applying, prospective residents should go in with eyes wide open.

“Albinen has no school, no bank, no post office, one remaining pub, one shop and a bus every hour. You have to anticipate that beforehand and accept it when you’re here,” she said.

For the right person, this sounds like a dream come true — as long as they're prepared for it!

ELIGIBILITY

1. Applicants must either be Swiss nationals or of Swiss descent, with at least one grandparent or great-grandparent being a Swiss national
2. Applicants must be a member or a legal dependent of members of the Arizona Swiss Society
3. Applicants must be enrolled or plan to enroll in a college or vocational/technical school for the coming academic year as full-time or part-time students (minimum 6 credit hours per semester)

SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS FOR ACADEMIC YEAR 2024-25

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

To be considered for a scholarship, please complete and submit the scholarship application form with the following documents:

1. Essay (maximum two pages), covering the following points:
 - a. Educational and career goals
 - b. Ties to Switzerland and the Arizona Swiss Society
 - c. Community involvement and service
 - d. Personal interests
 - e. What it means to you to receive this scholarship
2. Official transcripts of all course work completed at the college or university level
3. Graduated High School Seniors only: Official High School transcripts including grades for the Senior year. After a year of study at the college level, a High School transcript is no longer required
4. Copies of the ACT, SAT or other college level entrance examination (High School Seniors only)
5. Letters of recommendation from two unrelated individuals, stating the relationship to the applicant. Recommendations must be from the current year. Copies of previous recommendations are not acceptable.

NOTE: APPLICATIONS MUST BE POSTMARKED NO LATER THAN JUNE 30, 2024

AWARDS

A total between \$4000 and \$6000 will be distributed to three qualified students. The recommendation of scholarship recipients is at the sole discretion of a panel of Arizona educators independent of the Arizona Swiss Society. Successful applicants will be notified before the annual Fall Picnic. They will be recognized at this event and are expected to be present for the occasion. Award checks will be made payable to the applicant's school.

Cook's page for everyone



Walliser Gsottus / Valais specialty

The recipe for a Valais Gsottus from the Swiss canton of Valais is a little more complicated to prepare, but it is a delicacy!

Ingredients for 4 persons:

- 2 pears fresh or dried
- 1 Kg dried or smoked sheep, beef, pork
- 250 g potatoes
- 2 cloves of garlic
- 1 leek
- 2 beets
- pepper black and salt
- 200 g bacon
- 500 g white cabbage
- 1 large onion
- 3 cloves and a bay leaf



Instructions:

- 1 Fill a wide pot with cold water. Then add the meat and bacon to the pot and let the whole thing rest for 12 to 14 hours. The meat must be completely covered with water.
- 2 Now spike the onion with 1 bay leaf and 3 cloves and add them to the pot with the meat. Then bring the water to boil and let the meat steep in the boiling water for about three hours. When the pieces of meat are cooked, gradually remove them from the water and set them aside.
- 3 Then add the sliced potatoes, white cabbage, leek, beets, and the pears to the soup, and cook for about 15 minutes.
- 4 Meanwhile, put the meat back into the broth and let it steep. So it's getting hot again.

Tip:

Enjoy this meal with a piece of Valais rye bread or white bread and Valais mountain cheese.
